If you've driven down Ravinia Drive recently, you're probably well aware of the transformation that's been happening on the 133-acre campus of George Williams College of Aurora University during the past several years. New structures, renovated buildings and beautiful garden landscapes are creating a vibrant environment for learning. Student life has also become more active on campus with our first traditional freshman class enrolling in the fall of 2012 as well as other returning undergraduates, transfer students and graduate students.

Like our current freshmen, I'm relatively new to George Williams College, having arrived in the fall of 2011. What continues to impress me about the college is its relationship with the community. GWC hosts conferences, organizes cultural programs, such as Music by the Lake, and partners with local organizations, including the Geneva Lake Environmental Association and the Water Safety Patrol.

In addition to maintaining good community relations, I remain committed to renewing GWC's focus on education. One of our goals for George Williams is to make it a college of choice for prospective students. I'm seeing that happen as I greet students daily on their way to class, observe them working on campus projects or converse with them in the dining hall. Our students are enrolled in a variety of

academic disciplines. Majors include elementary education, parks and recreation, psychology, social work, sustainability and environmental management, and writing and English. That is, students learn to approach problem solving with an ethically sound perspective, and professors empower them to create sustainable solutions to societal needs and challenges. Wis. Historical Society assumes management of Black Point Estate

Black Point Estate, officially joined the other 11 historic sites and museums managed by the Wisconsin Historical Society, effective January 1.

Chicago beer baron Conrad Seipp built the grand Queen Anne-style home in 1888 as a summer family getaway to give his family respite from the heat and bustle of the city. Seipp's great-grandson, William O. Petersen, donated the 20-room house, its grounds and furnishings to the state of Wisconsin in September 2005 for use as a state historic site.

Following a \$1.9 million state-financed restoration overseen by the Department of Administration, Black Point opened for visitation in June 2007. Between then and January 1, 2013, the Black Point Preserve Inc. Board of Directors, composed of dedicated volunteers, ably managed the house and property.

During that time the Preserve shared the story of the house and family with tens of thousands of visitors who arrive at the estate the most authentic and popular way, by boat, just as family and friends

did in a bygone era.

The house is one of the oldest mansions on Geneva Lake. The Seipp family, while building Black Point, was simultaneously building a new mansion in Chicago and moved much of the furniture from the family's previous Chicago home into Black Point. The four generations of Seipp kept all of those furnishings in the house, making it a rare time capsule for historians. As each generation took its place, though, it added its own touches so that now everyday household items range from Victorian to modern but share the same family provenance.

"We're delighted to welcome Black Point into our network of historic sites and museums," said Ellsworth Brown, the Ruth and Hartley Barker Director of the Society. "We have a longstanding tradition of interpreting the state's history through historic homes and buildings,



and Black Point is a real treasure chest of Wisconsin history."

Black Point is open for tours from May through October. For the rest of the year, it quietly sleeps as it has for more than 124 years.

A conservation easement protects Black Point and its 620 feet of shoreline from future development, and a conditional use permit helps define the parameters of operation so that Black Point will continue the operating traditions that protect the privacy of nearby residents.

Black Point—A Family Tradition...

It has been my pleasure to volunteer and work at the Black Point Estate for the past five years. Growing up on a farm just a short distance from Black Point, my family has had ties to the Seipp family through four generations.

My great grandmother, Julia Kaye Reek, was a friend of Catharina Seipp and they often shared tea in the summer. My grandmother, Alice Reek Merwin, and later my mother, Gladys Merwin, both sold eggs to the family at Black Point when they didn't have their own chickens.

When I was a child, often Edward and Zeka Petersen would come to the farm to get the eggs for the house and their children would be with them to have a ride on one of our ponies. In return, as children, my brother and I would be invited to join them in swimming at the Black Point boathouse.

We are delighted that this very special property has been preserved and is now open to the public. The Black Point Historic Preserve Board has done a monumental job in bringing the prop-

erty to the point that it is now. It has taken countless hours of leadership and volunteer work to maintain and preserve the house and grounds, as well as make the story of the house and its contents appealing to guests. This past summer, over 50 people from the area worked to provide the tours of Black Point, in addition to the Preserve Board of Directors and its committees.

With the management transition to the Wisconsin Historical Society, we not only will see experienced management, but they will also add another very important component to Black Point - their expertise in archival recording and preservation. Both the contents of the house and the vast amount of family and area history that is also available in the house will now be permanently recorded, and additional steps will be taken to preserve these things.

Area people will still be needed to volunteer and work at the house, as it takes a good number of folks to offer daily tours and maintain the warm and friendly welcome to Black Point that has always been the family trademark.

GLLC and DNR work to resolve Geneva Lake level concerns

The Geneva Lake Level Corporation (GLLC) and Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR) are working toward a solution to a dispute over the operation of the dam that controls the water level in Geneva Lake.

According to GLLC President Karl Otzen, the greater Geneva Lake community will be notified when a resolution is reached; the GLA plans to inform its members by email as well.

Efforts on the part of GLLC included hiring experts in state law and hydrology in order to intelligently discuss and negotiate with the DNR.

As those assets come with substantial cost, the GLLC is accepting donations to restore reserve funds needed to repair and maintain the dam and raceway facilities.

The Geneva Lake Association donated \$2,500 to the GLLC in November, and encourages its members to help by making contributions to the GLLC at PO Box 656, Lake Geneva, WI 53147.

Scholarships benefit area students

Environmental focus for student funding

The Environmental Education Foundation (EEF) was founded in 1980 as an affiliate of the Geneva Lake Association. During its 30-year history, the EEF has awarded over \$350,000 in college scholarships and camping and outdoor workshop awards to over 350 area youth, from 6th grade through graduate school.

Over \$20,000 can be awarded in a single year to students in a variety of age groups and educational levels. Included in this amount is the Environmental Education Foundation Thomas E. Reynolds (TER) Endowment Fund, which annually contributes \$8000 in the form of a four-year scholarship to a local graduating senior interested in pursuing a degree in the environmental science field.

The EEF maintains an informative web site at <http://envedfnd.org/>. The web-site includes descriptions of the funding that is available, as well as downloadable application forms. Application deadlines are varied, so applicants are encouraged to browse through the programs and applications to avoid missing out on the opportunities which are offered. *Many of the programs have an April 1 application deadline.*

Yerkes 'Skynet' receives NSF Grant

Approximately 1,400 middle schoolers nation-wide will explore the universe with research-grade robotic telescopes over the next three years, thanks to a \$1.6 million program funded by the National Science Foundation and led by the University of Chicago at Yerkes Observatory in Williams Bay.

Called *Skynet Junior Scholars*, the program will train 180 4-H leaders and informal educators to engage their youths in telescopic observations of planets, asteroids, galaxies and other cosmic targets during summer camps or weekly club meetings at Yerkes Observatory in Wisconsin; the National Radio Astronomy Observatory in Green Bank, West Virginia; and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.


